The scholarship is in memory of and honoring Joe Hearn, a beloved member of our community, who loved both the youth of our area and raising and caring for chickens.

The scholarship will be awarded, per year, for the duration of the funding. The scholarship is for eligible 4-H members in 5th and 6th grades, seeking to participate in the Chick Chain program.

Biographical sketch of Mr.Joe Hearn:

Mr. Hearn enjoyed a career as a feed mill worker for Mosley's Seed & Grain and McKenzie Feed & Grain and also an employee of Halls True Value. He was born October 2, 1935, in the Pillowville Community to Homer and Maggie Lois Hearn. He was a member of First Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Mr. Hearn had a wonderful sense of humor and was an avid storyteller.

The purpose of this scholarship is to provide assistance to students who want to participate in the Chick Chain program. The Chick Chain program curriculum focuses on small livestock caretaking skills and responsibility. The assistance will include the initial cost of purchasing the chicks and a starter kit consisting of a bag of feed, a feeder and a waterer.

Applicants will be required to participate in an essay contest. The intent of the essay contest is to have the student speak with an older person and have the older person tell the student a story from their youth. The subject of the essay will be to describe the person interviewed and tell their story.
